






# WAGE STUDY




This study, conducted in collaboration with external consultants and human resources professionals, assessed current pay structures relative to industry standards and regional benchmarks.


The findings of the study highlighted areas for adjustment and provided valuable insights to guide future salary recommendations.






#### **Criminal Cases Terminated**




#### Clearance Rates Statewide in 2024 (10 Most Populous Counties)



### COURT EXPENDITURES IN 2024



The 2024 General Fund Budget appropriation for the Common Pleas Court, General Division, was set at \$14,222,436.38. The Court is pleased to report that we finished the fiscal year under budget, with General Fund expenses totaling \$13,686,704.97.

The 2024 General Fund expenditures, listed by Department, were as follows:

Judicial Administration Expenses = \$7,091,752.17: This included funding for the following departments: Judicial, Administration, Bailiffs, Jury Commission, Judicial Staff Attorneys, Magistrates, Treatment Court, Dispute Resolution, Court Reporters, and A/V Tech.

Regional Court Services Expenses = \$3,601,276.39: This included funding for the following departments: Centralized Drug Testing, Electronic Monitoring, and Pre-Trial Services.

Adult Probation Expenses = \$2,993,676.41

# AV / TECH



In 2024, the Lucas County Common Pleas Court – General Division made significant strides in modernizing courtroom technology with the installation of a new Courtroom Recording and Presentation system.

This comprehensive upgrade enhanced the quality and reliability of audio and video recording, ensuring accurate and secure documentation of all proceedings.

The system also improved evidence presentation capabilities, allowing for seamless integration of digital exhibits and real-time display for judges, juries, attorneys, and public observers.

These improvements support both inperson and remote participation, reflecting the Court's continued commitment to accessibility, transparency, and operational efficiency.



The AV Tech team was instrumental in managing the installation, providing user training, and ensuring a smooth transition across multiple courtrooms.

#### LUCAS COUNTY ADULT PROBATION DEPARTMENT

Established in 1950, the Lucas County Adult Probation Department provides supervision of individuals ordered to Community Control in lieu of incarceration by the Lucas County Common Pleas Court. The department serves as a major partner in the justice system whose overall mission is to carry out orders from the Court to rehabilitate offenders in a cost-effective community-based setting, while preserving public safety. We strive to hold offenders accountable while promoting positive behavior change to effectively reduce recidivism and support those whose lives have been impacted by crime.


# OFFENDER Supervision

As of January 1, 2024, the department supervised 1,880 offenders. At this same time, 78 defendants were actively undergoing a presentence investigation, and another 175 defendants were being supervised in the Pretrial Diversion program. Throughout the year, 799 new probationers were placed on Community Control, and another 969 were terminated or removed from supervision. By year's end, LCAPD was supervising a total of 1,710 probationers.

Of those probationers, 88% were under supervision for at least one (or more) felony conviction(s), and another 12% of probationers were under supervision for misdemeanor (only) conviction(s).



# CASELOAD BY RISK LEVEL


The Probation Department supervises offenders ordered to Community Control using an evidence-based risk reduction model. Probationers are assigned to caseloads based upon their identified risk for recidivism and the needs they present with.



Of the reports prepared by the Probation Department, post-conviction relief reports help to clear the record of dismissal or conviction, as well as aid in the determination of relief from certain convictions for those individuals that apply. The reports consist of motions for sealing and expungement of criminal records, petitions for relief from weapons disability, and Certificates of Qualification for Employment (CQEs), among others. The Probation Department prepared 525 postconviction relief reports during 2024.


#### SEALING / EXPUNGEMENT OF RECORDS

Of those cases before the Court for sealing or expungement in 2024, 67% were granted, 18% were denied, 11% were withdrawn by the applicant, and another 4% had dispositions listed as "Other." An additional 8 cases that were successfully completed in Treatment Court had their records sealed upon completion.



# COMMUNITY SERVICE

A total of 99 probationers (69 Community Control and 30 Pretrial Diversion) completed a total of 3,945 hours of Community Service work during 2024, resulting in a total of \$39,450 of labor given back in service hours to the community.




# FORENSIC Monitor


At year end, the Forensic Monitor was supervising 69 defendants found Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity (NGRI) or Incompetent to Stand Trial – Unrestorable – Criminal Court Jurisdiction. The Forensic Monitor serves as a liaison between Northwest Ohio Behavioral Healthcare, local treatment agencies, and the Court. This position is responsible for ensuring the supervision of these individuals once they return to the community. During 2024, there were 12 individuals whose commitment to the Court had expired.

# TERMINATIONS FROM PROBATION



### INTERSIVE SUPERVISION / HIGH RISK PROBATION



The Intensive Supervision/High Risk probation unit, funded by the Community Corrections Act grant through the Bureau of Community Sanctions, oversees those defendants whose felony level offenses may have warranted state level incarceration, however, were placed on Community Control. This unit supervises those offenders granted Judicial Release, as well as several specialized caseloads.



Mental Health Caseload (2): Felony level offenders with a recent diagnosis of a severe and persistent mental illness and are at a moderate to high risk of recidivism may be placed on this caseload. Two Probation Officers overseeing these caseloads work closely with community treatment agencies, including the Unison ACT (Assertive Community Treatment) Team, which uses a multidisciplinary approach to deliver comprehensive community based behavioral health services.

Sex Offender Caseload (1): Felony offenders sentenced for an offense under Chapter 2907 (Sex Offenses) of the Ohio Revised Code, are placed on this caseload and supervised by a Probation Officer with multiple certifications in overseeing a population of sex offenders. The Probation Officer facilitates group programming using the Cognitive Behavioral Interventions for Sexual Offending (CBISO) curriculum, ensuring that offenders complete 52 sessions geared toward increasing the value participants place on prosocial thoughts and choices.

Interpersonal Violence Caseload (1): Felony offenders sentenced for a Domestic Violence offense or those whose offenses are related to a pattern of relational violence are assigned to this caseload and supervised by a Probation Officer specially trained in this topic. Two supervising Probation Officers within the department are certified in the Cognitive Behavioral Interventions for Interpersonal Violence (CBI-IPV) programming through the University of Cincinnati. Since the onset of the CBI-IPV groups in late 2023, 4 groups of offenders have completed a 30 week course.


# **INTERSIVE SUPERVISION / HIGH RISK PROBATION**



The Intensive Supervision Unit of the Probation Department admitted 260 probationers and terminated 286 probationers from the program.



Of the terminations, 127 defendants were successfully terminated from supervision (44%), 40 were terminated unsuccessfully (27%), 5 had their supervision revoked resulting in state level incarceration (2%), 23 absconded from supervision (8%), and 9 were deceased (3%). An additional 42 probationers were under courtesy supervision from another county and were terminated/returned to their sending county, and another 16% had terminations listed as "other."

#### LUCAS COUNTY REGIONAL COURT SERVICES

Regional Court Services plays an integral role in the criminal legal system in Lucas County by providing substance use testing, electronic monitoring supervision, and pretrial assessment and supervision to all criminal courts in the County.

During 2024, the primary focus of the department was on quality assurance and continuous quality improvement.

Regional Court Services employs 44 full-time and 5 part-time dedicated individuals. Each staff member is obligated to maintain the integrity of the Department and provide the judiciary with the highest possible level of service.

# **CENTRALIZED DRUG TESTING UNIT (CDTU)**

Centralized Drug Testing Unit provides forensic urinalysis testing for defendants from Common Pleas Court, as well as the municipal courts and other area agencies.


In order to keep up with changing substance use trends, during 2024 CDTU increased the standard number of substances it tested per sample from five to eight, and it eliminated testing for ETG.


Each year, CDTU obtains its American Bioanalyst Certification. This certification indicates that the results generated by the Beckman Coulter DxC 700 AU Clinical Chemistry system are accurate and confirms that the staff working in the lab are in compliance with all testing procedures. CDTU continues to achieve 100% on all of its certifications, which are performed quarterly every year.






#### **Substance Use Testing Characteristics**






# SUBSTANCES OF ABUSE


Positivity rates help us understand usage trends. They are determined by the percentage of specimens that tested positive for any given substance. During 2024, marijuana (THC) continued to test positive most often, followed by Buprenorphine and Cocaine.



# **SUBSTANCES OF** ABUSE

In addition to urinalysis testing, Centralized Drug Testing administers oral swab testing under certain circumstances. Oral swabs test all substances that could be screened for in a urine specimen. Oral swabs will not always yield the same results as urinalysis testing due to different detection windows and cutoff values. Yet, positivity rates by substance for oral swabs compare to those of urinalysis.

# ELECTRONIC Monitoring (EM)


Regional Court Services' Electronic Monitoring program provides intensive supervision services to most of the courts in Lucas County through Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) and Transdermal Alcohol Detection (TAD) technology. These units are made available to all courts within the County through contractual agreement with Sylvania and Toledo Municipal Courts and other agreements with County administrators. Additionally, GPS units continue to be utilized with defendants who are ordered into the County's Work Release program.





### DEFENDANT POPULATION


The number of defendants placed in the Electronic Monitoring program continued its upward trend through 2024. Of those placed, 55.3% were in pretrial status and awaiting resolution of their case. Traditionally not all clients who are referred to EM are able to be placed in the program. Some are found to be ineligible, while others had their EM condition modified, revoked or stayed prior to placement or had other cases or bonds that prevented placement. Data regarding the total number of clients referred to Electronic Monitoring during 2024 was unavailable.




#### <u>New Defendants</u>

#### Average Number of Days Served





# **PRETRIAL SERVICES**

Pretrial Services is responsible for the processing of defendants at arrest and subsequent monitoring of defendants placed on supervised release. The primary focus is on court appearance, public safety and the use of evidence-based practices.


#### PRETRIAL BOOKING


The Pretrial Assessment Officers in the Pretrial Booking area of the Lucas County Corrections Center complete risk-based pretrial assessments on nearly all booked defendants to assist judicial officers from all five criminal courts in the County with making bond decisions. The assessment predicts the likelihood of a defendant appearing in court, committing a new crime while awaiting trial and the probability of any new crime being violent. Nearly 36% of assessments are completed on felony cases. In addition, Pretrial Assessment Officers assist the Lucas County Sheriff's Office with release of defendants.



# PRETRIAL BOOKING

Pretrial Assessment Officers assist the Lucas County Sheriff's Office with release of defendants from the pretrial detention facility. Pursuant to Lucas County's Pretrial Jail Population Management Policy and best practices in the pretrial legal system, pretrial defendants who are booked with low-level, non-violent, no human victim or sexually-oriented offenses and who are assessed as having a higher probability of appearing in court and remaining arrest free are able to be released prior to seeing a Judge. These are referred to as delegated releases. During 2024, a total of 2,920 defendants with 5,521 cases met criteria for this release type. Pretrial Assessment Officers execute paperwork for own recognizance releases that are ordered by Judges, either by phone or as a result of a court proceeding. They also assist with the cash bonds that are posted after normal court business hours.






### PRETRIAL BOND Supervision

Pretrial Supervision Officers supervise defendants who are released on Supervised Own Recognizance or Monitored Own Recognizance bonds and monitor substance use testing orders, prohibitions against defendant contact with victims, and any other conditions as set by the Court. Most violations of conditions of bond are first managed internally through graduated misconduct responses before being reported to the Court.




Pretrial supervision successful outcomes are measured by court appearance and no new arrests. Outcome data is recorded by Pretrial Supervision Officers.

#### **Pretrial Supervision Success Rates**




# DEPARTMENT REVENUE

During 2024, the Jury Commission Office continued to render service to all divisions of the Lucas County Common Pleas Court and to the Toledo Municipal Court. A total of twenty-two (22) Judges are served through the centralized jury pool system.

The Court operates on a one-week term of service, which requires prospective jurors to be on stand-by status for five specific days. The term for jury service is either five days, or if selected as a trial juror, the duration of one trial. Only the number of jurors sufficient to respond to the jury trials confirmed for the following day are instructed to report. Only those jurors who report to the courthouse for jury service are paid. During 2024, the Court compensated jurors at the rate of \$15.00 per day for prospective trial jurors serving one-half day and \$25.00 per day for prospective trial jurors serving more than one-half day and seated trial jurors.

During 2024, 25,050 citizens received a summons for trial jury service, 3,698 individuals actually reported to the courthouse for jury service, and 41 panels were sent to a courtroom to begin a jury trial.

The Grand Jury system continues to operate as an everyday system. Grand Jurors generally serve one-half day, every day, for two weeks. Grand jurors are paid \$15.00 per day.

## JURY COMMISSION

## JURY FEE Donation program

The Court has continued to authorize the Jury Commission to operate a program to accept the donation of all or part of the juror's daily fee, with the funds collected being deposited into the Administration of Justice fund. The money collected is used for the benefit of the jurors. A portion of this funding is used to provide free coffee and snack service to jurors while they are in the Jury Assembly Room. During 2024, a total of \$3,482.50 was collected in donations and \$3,593.19 was expended.



The Court has intentionally taken a very low-key approach to the project to avoid any sense that the jurors are being pressured to donate. The jurors have been very generous in their consideration of this program to cover costs that directly benefit the citizens who serve as jurors. This account has allowed the Jury Commission to continue offering various items to enhance juror comfort during their time at the Court.

### ADULT TREATMENT COURT Specialized Docket

The Court continues to have a very effective specialized docket program. In 2024, under the leadership of Presiding Judge Ian B. English -- the docket saw its official third recertification from the Supreme Court of Ohio. This certification is in effect until December 31, 2026.

In coordination with state and federal initiates, the Adult Treatment Court received grant funding from four different sources for the year 2024. These funds assist with programming needs; recovery services and additional treatment services to participants; and assist with the overall costs of Adult Treatment Court.

#### Enhancements to the Adult Treatment Court Program

The Adult Treatment Court Specialized Docket saw the addition of Lucas County Common Pleas Court Security/Law Enforcement as members of the Treatment Team. These officers act in a capacity of community policing with, in the field, checks of the participants in the program.



Through cooperative efforts with the Lucas County Adult Probation Department - Treatment Court participants also saw the addition of weekend drug testing. Drug testing follows a true random model that assists with participant accountability.

It is through the supportive efforts of the Lucas County Treatment Court that recidivism is lessoned and the savings to the Lucas County taxpayers is in excess of \$7.9 million dollars since 2016.

## MAGISTRATE'S DEPARTMENT

The Magistrate's Department is composed of two General Division Magistrates, John Wilmore and Gretchen Weston. Magistrates Wilmore and Weston are supported by Case Manager Dawn Wood and Case Manager Jessica Kozak. In addition to supporting Magistrate Wilmore and Magistrate Weston, Case Manager Wood also oversees the retention of evidence for the Court.

### Three Primary Purposes:

Overseeing and adjudicating Civil Stalking Protection Order Petitions.

Mediating civil cases of all kinds, with a focus on personal injury, real estate disputes, mortgage foreclosures, and tax foreclosures.

Supporting the Lucas County Adult Treatment Court and providing additional support to the Lucas County General Division Judges as needed, such as pretrial coverage and Ohio Civil Rule 55 hearings.

## MAGISTRATE'S DEPARTMENT



In late 2023 and early 2024, the Magistrate's Department relocated from the Family Court Building to a re-designed and updated space on the First Floor of the Lucas County Common Pleas Courthouse.

The construction of a hearing room, alongside two multi-purpose rooms, has made it possible for Magistrate Wilmore and Magistrate Weston to conduct inperson and zoom mediations simultaneously, or alternatively to hold a Civil Stalking Protection Order Hearing while also conducting mediations.

Previously, the combination space of a hearing room/mediation room made it difficult, if not impossible, for a mediation to take place at the same time as a protection order hearing.



Our mediation program continues to be very effective, and cases can be referred to the program by Judges, Attorneys, or Litigants.


There is no restriction to the monetary value of cases that may be referred.


Funding for the mediation program comes from court filing fees.




#### Cases Returned Without Mediation



# **OVERVIEW**

This past year has brought many changes in the Office of Court Deputies. From a new scheduling format to updated policies and procedures, the Common Pleas Court Deputies are striving to be a department that sets a standard of excellence while upholding our motto of "Protecting Justice".

#### In 2024 the employee's serving in the Office of Court Deputies have made the following improvements to our operations:

Twenty-three new policies and procedures were issued covering the
essential duties of our operations.

- Implementation of the NORIS Report Wise system allowing court deputies to file police reports documenting arrests and reporting on criminal and non-criminal incidents occurring within court operations.
- New uniform program and new department insignias.
- A new straight 7-hour schedule that increases available manpower during peak times.
- Implementation of the Mobile Unit to specialize in prisoner transport, responding to emergencies at off-site locations, investigations, and community policing support for the Treatment Court.
- New training agreement with Owens Community College giving deputies access to over 56 different available law enforcement courses including courses that fulfill all 24 hours of required OPOTA CPT training.
- Training officers were certified to teach Taser, First Aid/CPR, Field Training, and De-Escalation.
- All supervisors and deputies assigned to the Mobile Unit were trained and qualified on the AR-15 weapon system.
